



APPLICATION PROCESS

How Fellows are chosen

Fellows are selected in the Fall by their League member school or by an at-large selection process.

AT A LEAGUE SCHOOL

The primary selection process occurs intramurally at each League college or university through a process developed by the member school. The member school chooses its Fellows for each session, and the Posse Foundation also selects two Fellows for each session. Interested students at League schools should check with the Campus Reconciliation League Liaison.

APPLYING FROM OUTSIDE THE LEAGUE

The “at large” slots (about 15% of each cohort) are filled by the Reconciliation League administrative team through an open process that allows students from any non-member school to apply. No applicant will be considered unless the application is supported by a faculty recommendation letter warranting that the applicant meets League standards for admission. Each application must contain:

- A personal statement describing the student’s academic interests and reasons for seeking to participate
- A short essay identifying a significant challenge, opportunity, or question affecting a community or environment the student knows personally
- A brief statement from the League Liaison or selection chair
- A faculty recommendation on academic abilities, character, and capacity for collaboration
- A curriculum vitae or resume
- An official or unofficial academic transcript

Selection occurs in the Fall semester. Deadlines matter.

Frequently asked questions

What is a Reconciliation League Fellowship?

A Fellowship covers tuition, room, board, visa costs where applicable, program activities, and other required costs of the summer session and the following January Summit. Fellows are generally responsible for travel to and from both.

Do I need to attend a Reconciliation League member university to participate?

No. Students from League member schools constitute over 80% of each cohort; however, at least 15% of the Fellowships are awarded through an “at-large” process that enables students from schools that are not League members to apply.

What year of college must I be in to participate?

Applicants should generally be in their first, second, or third year of undergraduate study at the time they apply. Students in their final year of study are also eligible and will be considered.

Do Fellows receive academic credit for participating?

Yes. Fellows receive academic credit for their coursework and Fellowship activities, and will receive an official transcript from New York University. How those credits are recognized and applied toward degree requirements is determined by each Fellow’s home institution in accordance with its transfer-credit policies.

Is the League affiliated with a particular political, religious, or ideological movement?

No. The League is not affiliated with or intended to advance any particular political, religious, or ideological perspective. Its bylaws require an independent external review every two years to assess its continuing fidelity to its mission of open dialogue across difference.

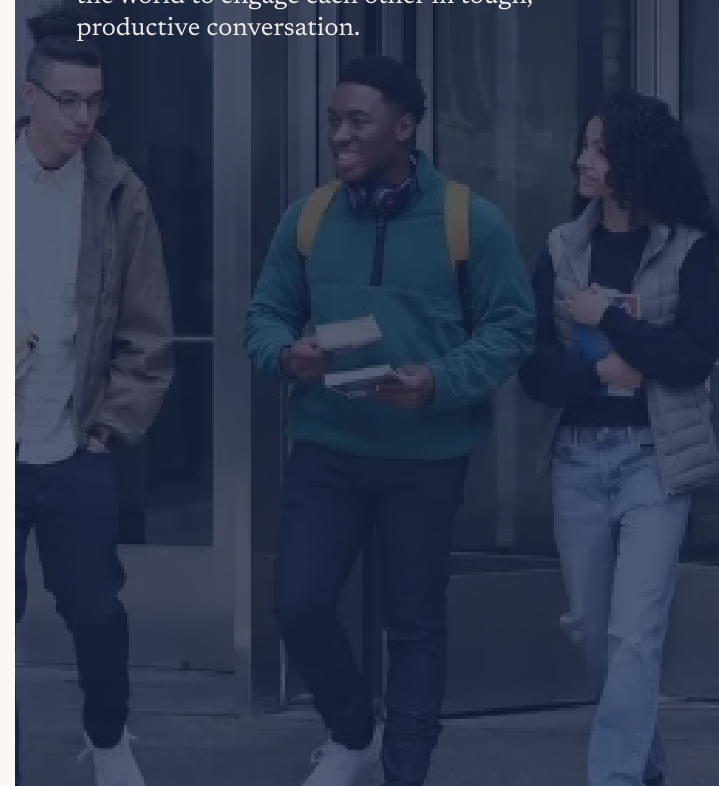

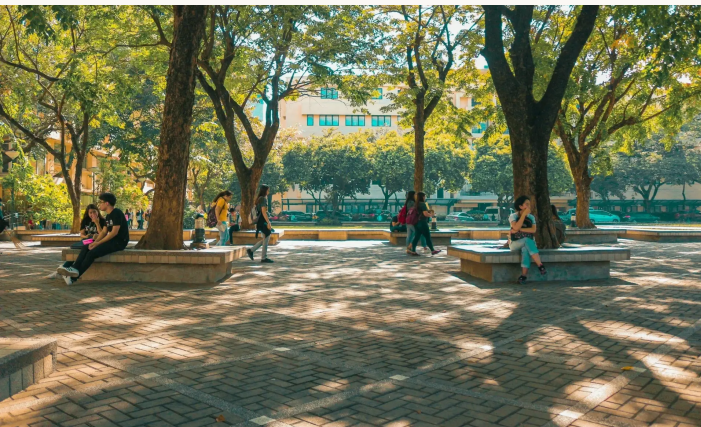

SIX COMPONENTS, ONE INTEGRATED PROGRAM

01 Anchor Course

A shared course on the problems and methods of reconciliation, taken by every Fellow.

02 Honors Seminars

A choice of a seminar on subjects ranging from the art of diplomacy to the chemistry of cooking, with an emphasis on how they deal with difference.

03 Evening Talks

A collection of evening talks with global thought leaders.

04 The Retreat

An off-the-grid, team-building retreat that puts the program's ideas into practice.

05 The Fall Project

A group project carried back to each Fellow's campus and community in the Fall semester.

06 The January Summit

The full cohort reconvenes in January to report on projects and plan ahead.

AFTER THE FELLOWSHIP

Having completed the initial program, the Fellows may be welcomed into the Reconciliation Corps; as Corps members, they pledge to continue over time the mission of building bridges.
